Each year that passes is an opportunity for Legacy Foundation to celebrate our collaborative victories, which we achieve through increased understanding of, and coordination with, the people, organizations and communities of Lake County. In all our efforts, we are committed to both a deeper and broader impact. We are committed to collaborating with donors and partners to deliver on the promise we've made as a community foundation to provide philanthropic support for causes that fulfill dreams, build communities and enhance the quality of life in Lake County.

The key to our commitment is making sure we involve the people and organizations that we endeavor to help in truly committing to work with us to grow and become more self-sufficient and more valuable to the constituents they serve. Similar to the idea that it is better to teach a man to fish than to just give him a fish, Legacy Foundation wants to make sure recipients of our grants and scholarships are fully involved in the process so as to ensure their continued success, long after the funds have been used. In this way, we are not giving handouts; we are creating legacies, which we believe will continue to serve our community for years to come.

During the past year Legacy has been fortunate to celebrate many victories, small and large. Here are just a few:

- We enhanced The Think Tank, our resource center for helping non-profits find new ways to fulfill their missions efficiently and effectively. As a result, six first-time applicants received grant awards among a pool of 20 recipients. Total grant funds awarded increased 14 percent between the CY12-CY13 September grant cycle.
- We continued to work with donors to achieve their philanthropy goals, establishing 12 new funds.
- We partnered with private and public funding sources to address longstanding place-based issues that impact our region. The Gary Northside Redevelopment Area Project is underway, and Legacy commenced the application process for the Neighborhood Spotlight program at a press conference on December 20, 2013.

For the past three years, we have benefited from the visionary leadership of Harry Vande Velde, who served as our President from June 2010 to September 2013. Harry expanded our partnerships and scope of work. He extended Legacy's helping hand into the Lake County non-profit community, offering them a partnership to improve clarity of purpose, operation and success via The Think Tank. And, Harry reached outside of Lake County to enlist organizations with the skills and resources needed in partnership to help us tackle some truly stubborn and vital issues in our communities. Overall, he reinforced our commitment to do so much more than we had done before.

Legacy's success requires two things. One is passionate people. The members of Legacy's Board along with our non-profit partners and our donors are people who believe in the power to affect change. The other requirement is resources. Our successes continually rely upon our ability to give, lead and make a difference. Lasting impact requires persistence and assistance – ongoing grants that send kids to camp, help clean up the lakeshore, sustain those in need, and which offer myriad additional, positive opportunities.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Legacy Foundation, Inc. (the "Foundation") which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Legacy Foundation, Inc. as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.



A HISTORY OF Wise Planning and a Future Built on Solid Growth

Financial Growth and Continued Success In 1992 local area leaders formed the Endowment Fund of Lake County, Inc. in partnership with the Lilly Endowment, the purpose of which was to provide for the social service, educational, environmental and health needs of the residents of Lake County, Indiana. The initial matching funds totaled \$2 million.

With a name change in 1995, the Legacy Foundation distributed its first grants of nearly \$175,000 in 1997 and awarded its first scholarships worth nearly \$50,000 in 1998. By the year 2000, Legacy had 62 different funds under its control. By 2002, Legacy celebrated its 10th anniversary sharing in \$15 million dollars in Lilly Foundation grants that were used by Lake, LaPorte and Porter counties to help improve education across the three counties.

In 2007, grants and scholarships awarded annually totaled \$1.4 million, a remarkable increase from our initial distributions in 1997 and 1998. 2008 brought us an additional \$800,000 from Lumina Foundation for college readiness programs.

Today, Legacy Foundation has nearly \$47 million in total assets and more than 260 endowment funds which assist over 250 non-profit organizations. The foundation also administers more than 30 scholarship programs. All together, Legacy has awarded over \$28 million in grants and scholarships to Lake County organizations and individuals. The future promises even greater rewards.

The Think Tank

Thinking Ahead with The Think Tank

Former President/CEO Harry J. Vande Velde III inaugurated The Think Tank at Legacy Foundation on May 2, 2012. The Think Tank was predicated on the idea that community leaders, organizations and residents are fully aware of the problems they face and very often have ideas and insight to help solve them. All they need are the resources to help develop effective community programs.

The Think Tank gives them a forum with which they can focus their issues and provides the counsel, the connections and the collective support to address workable solutions. Legacy Foundation has learned through two decades of experience how critical it is to marry the quality of an idea with the proper program design. Too many charitable efforts fail because the program designers lack the resources to develop an effective means of funding, administering and maintaining the program.

With The Think Tank, Legacy Foundation offers non-profit organizations, residents, donors, local universities and even national partners the help they need to create innovative and effective programs and to make existing ones more viable. We do this by providing just the right amount of assistance at just the right time.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Helping with educational needs in Lake County has been a top priority of the Legacy Foundation since we began making awards. In the past 21 years, we have awarded more than \$8 million to help Lake County high school students pay for college. Here is a list of scholarships from the past year.
